President's Message:

Welcoming the Stranger: Building Community



Before the High Holy Days, your officers and Board of Trustees reached out to as many members as we could to wish everyone a happy, healthy new year and a good yuntif. Being a

congregation of over 750 families, if you did not receive a personal telephone call from one of us, please accept our apologies but know that we extend those heartfelt wishes now. This is a calling tradition our Board does before each Rosh Hashanah.

The purpose of our annual High Holy Day calls is also to show our members that we are a caring community and appreciate every member being a part of The Temple.

As your president, I hear on a regular basis from longstanding and new members of how our Temple is such a welcoming community, like from a recent member who joined The Temple just two months ago. When I asked her about why she chose Nashville and our Temple, she said that she and her husband were tired of the many, large member Jewish congregations up north and were ready to find a more intimate congregation and city that offered the warmth and welcoming spirit of belonging to a religious community.

The Temple has been fortunate enough to welcome over 50 new families and individuals to our Temple as of September 2019, along with our Jews by Choice. Our membership roster continues to grow, which is a testament to our welcoming community.

As Jews welcoming is and always has been an integral part of who we are. "Welcoming the stranger" is one of Judaism's core principles. The commandment to be hospitable appears in the Torah 36 times – more than any other commandment. There are multiple levels of welcoming and many interpretations of hospitable.

With my husband and I about to have our daughter's wedding on November 2nd, I think of the chuppah, the wedding canopy where she and her fiancée will be taking their vows. In exploring its significance to welcoming the stranger, the chuppah is open on all four sides, mimicking Abraham's tent to be able to see travelers coming from any direction and to appear welcoming as they approach it, (Genesis 18:2).

The chuppah is symbolic of the home our daughter, Linzi, and Mark will build together, a message sent to the community on their wedding day that their home will be open and welcoming not only to their family and friends (who are standing under the chuppah) but to anyone wishing to visit. So important is the idea of hospitality that the rabbis write it into every marriage from the beginning.

Let's talk about what you can do on a personal level to help us continue to build our Temple community.

Adapted from the Union for Reform Judaism¹, here are five ways you can include your friends in Temple activities – from work, your yoga class, the dog park, or wherever you meet them:

Shabbat Worship. Invite a Jewish friend or family to join you at a Shabbat service this year. Our Temple has a wide range of Friday and Saturday morning services — some for adults, some for families, some musical, some including special speakers. Pick one that appeals to you and bring a friend!

Food. Meals are a wonderful way to share your Temple with friends. Instead of meeting at a restaurant or eating at home, invite friends to one of our Temple dinners. Nothing says "welcome" like sharing the Shabbat blessings and breaking bread together.

Adult Education. Our Temple has many lecture series and lifelong learning opportunities. Invite a friend or two to a class or lecture to nourish their soul (and yours) with engaging ideas and vibrant conversations.

Community Celebrations. If you love our congregation's community seders, Hanukkah festivities, or our FUN-raising events like the Mah Jongg Tournament, or the upcoming Nashville Philharmonic Orchestra to play on December 8th, perhaps your friends will, too. Inviting them to join you is a beautiful way to introduce them to your community and to kindle (or re-kindle) their interest in Jewish life at our Temple.

Social Action. Social action activities are often open to all, like serving meals to the homeless at our Room in the Inn, helping with a Habitat for Humanity build, or volunteering on Thanksgiving Day for the annual Boulevard Bolt. Share those experiences and the mitzvah (commandment) with your friends. They will thank you for it.

Would your friends like to meet other Jewish families or singles or empty nesters or seniors? They may feel better coming for the first time with others who can introduce them around and may simply be waiting for an invitation from you! You would not be pushing membership on them, but rather inviting them into a loving community where they will be welcomed. It is no different than when you love something, and you want to share it. If they already are affiliated with a synagogue, that's fine too. It's an opportunity to build connections between and among our Jewish communities. As our rabbis always say, "Our doors are wide enough for everyone who wishes to enter."

And, that is how you can help us continue to build our Temple community. Together. Bring a Friend.


Honoring a Sister and Honoring Her Temple

Just the Way We All Are

Fred Rogers was a visionary when it comes to early childhood, and no one was better at communicating the value of childhood and individuality than he. He is famously known for looking into the camera and speaking directly to his millions of viewers (young and old) to say "you make the day special just by your being you."

This is a message we all need to hear - particularly in times like these when diversity and individuality are challenged nearly every day.

It makes sense, then, that Fred Rogers was the inspiration for the 65th Annual Tennessee Association for Children's Early Education Conference.

This year's state conference took place here in Nashville and was headed by a team of four that included two of The Temple Preschool's own:
Corye Nelson and Moon Bishop.
Additionally, the third member of TPS's new Collaborative Leadership Team,
Candice Stern, facilitated three verywell-attended and praised workshops on Risk-Taking, Managing Challenging Behaviors, and Respecting Toddlers.

Our presence at this state conference was even supported by the participation

of one of TPS's own parents: Charlie Chamberlain presented a workshop on music in the classroom called "If You Can't Sing Well, Sing Loud!"

We were able to send a handful of teachers to the Pre-Conference event, Loose Parts and Executive Thinking Skills, and a second handful of teachers to Friday's workshops and events.

Nearly all our teachers were able to attend the final day of the Conference, learning more about Social-Emotional Development, Reggio-Inspired Practices, Challenging Behaviors, Health and Safety, Nature, and other important topics.

The overall message of the

Conference - Just the Way You Are - was both empowering and humbling. It was a reminder that the children we serve are more than the sum of what they can do. By the time they reach Kindergarten, they are complete people, just the way they are now, with skills and competency, curiosity, and big ideas about the world.

Our task as educators, then, is not just to meet them where they are but also from where we are with love, compassion, and the willingness to be vulnerable with children, while also being strong and steady. It's a big task.

But The Temple Preschool is up to that challenge.

Music for Seniors connects area musicians with older adults through the provision of live, interactive music outreach programs designed to engage and entertain, promote health and well-being, reduce isolation and enrich the lives of all participants. Recently, at the end of the music program, one of the performers was greeting each audience member individually – also part of our interactive directive. One participant, with tears streaming down his face, exclaimed, "You played me the songs of my life!"

The Temple funding helps support participating musicians and ongoing and expanding free services for low-income, nonprofit residential communities. Music for Seniors also supports groups of older adults at centers, nursing homes and day groups in currently served and new counties. It will also support free services to home-bound individuals. Music for Seniors was a 2012 Center for Nonprofit Management Salute to Excellence Award finalist.

The need is for Ushers to assist with off-loading and on-loading arriving van passengers, assisting individuals into and out of the venue and to and from their seats. They have older adult audience members at all levels of mobility, from active older adults to those who use walkers and some in wheelchairs.

Time-commitment is 3 hours, as follows:

Arrive I hour prior to show time for orientation, instructions and positioning for greeting audience. (Audience members often arrive early.)

Concerts are I hour long.

Assist up to I hour after the end of the concert. (But often it is only 30 minutes. Just depends on how quickly audience members depart.)
